Gospel Reading John 4: 23-26

A Samaritan woman came to draw water, and Jesus said to her, the hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshipers will worship Abba God in spirit and truth, for the God seeks such as these. ²⁴ God is spirit, and those who worship God must worship in spirit and truth." ²⁵ The woman said to Jesus, "I know that Messiah is coming" (who is called the Christ). And will proclaim all things to us." ²⁶ Jesus said to her, "I am the one, the one who is speaking to you."
